## Pros & Cons



- Uses the power of Google to find items generally considered to be scholarly.
- Searches across many different topics.
- Has a “cited by” list for other articles about a topic.
- Not all items are peer-reviewed or confirmed as scholarly.
- Does not cover all scholarly information about a subject.
- Full text not always immediately available.

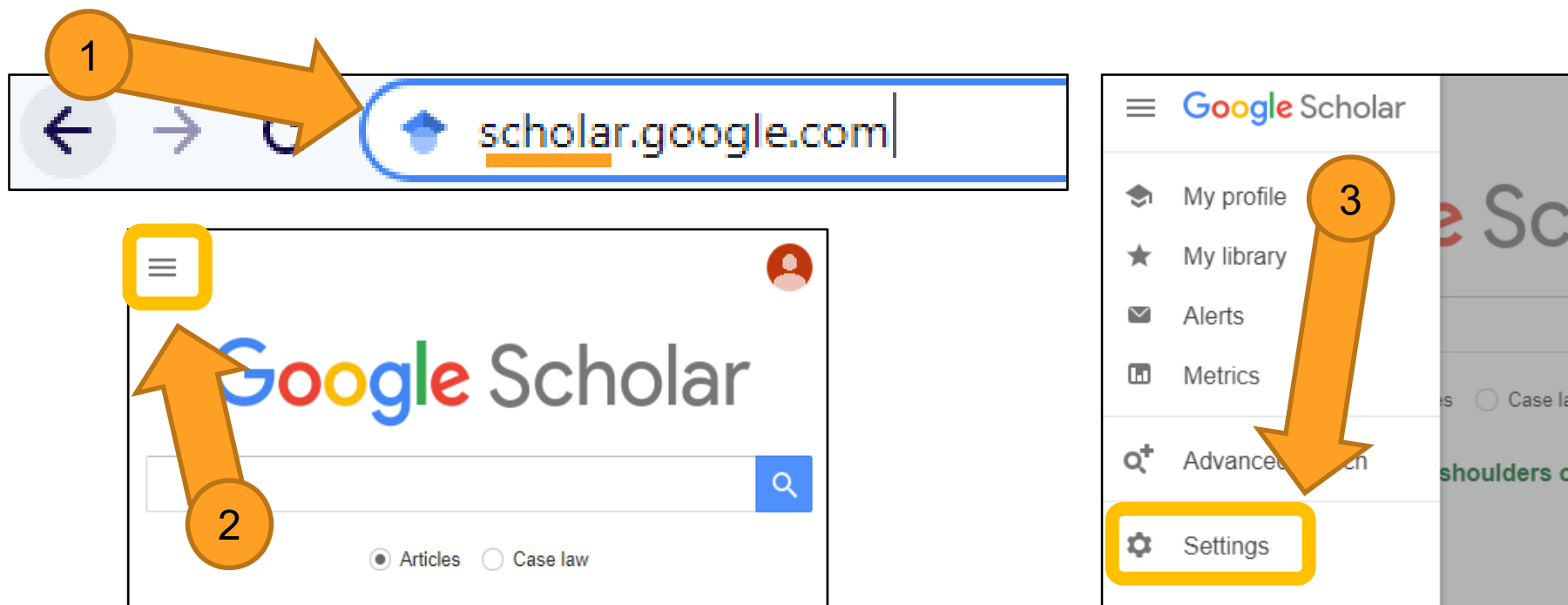
